
# Honoring Our Jubilarians

Born in Framingham, MA, she has been a teacher; worked with the AIDS ministry of the Archdiocese of Mwanza, Tanzania; and helped found and administer the Jesuit Refugee Service in Tanzania.

**Sister Martha Getchel, M.M.**, was a missionary to Peru for 49 years. Born in Minneapolis, Minn., she began as an educator in Lima, 1960-1969, and then was secretary-treasurer of the Juli Prelature, also working in its Catholic Education Office, 1969-1984. She worked in a family catechetics program in Tacn, Peru, 1984-2009.

**Sister Rosemary Huber, M.M.,** taught at Transfiguration School, Manahttan, in the early 1960s and was director of congregational health services at Maryknoll

Sisters Center, Ossining, 1992-1997. She also worked in hospitals and clinics in Korea, Indonesia, Jakarta, and East Timor, 1965-1992, and Nepal, 2000-2003.

**Sister Agnes Mary Joy, M.M.,** a native of Newburgh, is a clinical pastoral education specialist. She has taught in Panama, was technical director of a Jesuit boys school in Mexico, and was chaplain of Harris County Hospital District and supervisor of the Association of Clinical Pastoral Education, Ben Taub Medical Center, both in Houston, Tex.

**Sister Elsie Monge, M.M.**, is a human rights advocate and educator. Born in Quito, Ecuador, she taught in Guatemala and Panama, was executive director of the Ecuadoran Human Rights Commission and president of the Human Rights National Network of Ecuador, winning the Nobel Peace Prize in 2004 for her work.

**Sister Dora Rosa Nuetzi, M.M.,** a teacher at Transfiguration School, Manhattan, 1962-1965, has taught at schools in Hawaii and the Marshall Islands. She was one of three sisters to found several schools in the Marshall Island, where she served from 1985 to 2007. She was a religious education director in Hawaii, 1976-1978 and 1980-1985.

Sister Marian Puszcz, M.M., born in Yonkers, is a physician who has served in New York City, California, Tanzania, Kenya, Nicaragua and Bangladesh. A 1949 graduate of New York Medical College, she worked at New York Medical, as well as Metropolitan Hospital, Covenant House and New York Foundling Hospital.

**Sister Miedal Stone, M.M.**, has spent 36 years ministering in hospitals and with the elderly in China. Born in Los Angeles, she was co-coordinator of the congregation's Chi-Rho Community in 2008 and contact for its China Region in 2013.

# Two Communities of Sisters Share Faith, and a Monastery

A monastery in Beacon is now giving life to two communities of contemplative religious women who have found the living—and praying—arrangement mutually beneficial.

This all began when the Redemptoristine Nuns learned they would have

to leave their monastery on the grounds of Mount St. Alphonsus in Esopus because the Redemptorist Fathers would soon be selling that property. The sisters moved temporarily to

the West Park property of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus but they knew they would have to leave by the end of June 2013.

Needless to say, their search took on more urgency as the deadline neared. They enlisted the assistance of another woman religious who helps religious communities plan their futures. Last March 19, the feast of St. Joseph, they began a novena to St. Joseph "to help us find a new home," the Redemptoristine Nuns wrote in a letter to their friends and supporters this past Advent.

Last April, the Redemptoristine Nuns found a Lutheran-run assisted living facility in Mount Vernon to care for three of their sisters.

That same month, the other six Redemptoristines received an answer to their prayers for a place where they could live together. Their prioress, Sister Moira Quinn, O.Ss.R., went to visit the Carmel of the Incarnation in Beacon. At that point, the Discalced Carmelite Nuns were discerning how best to use the extra space available in their monastery. Recent deaths had left their community with 16 members and plenty of extra rooms. They had offered other communities a place for retreats and short stays, but had begun to think about seeking a more permanent solution, said Sister Marjorie Robinson, O.C.D., their prioress.

The day Sister Moira visited, the Carmelites were having a community meeting. One by one the other sisters came

home in Garrison, NY

up to Sister Marjorie with essentially the same question: "Can't we do something for the Redemptoristines?"

The two religious communities had known each other for a long time. For some 45 years, they have been members of the Metropolitan Association of Contemplative Communities. Having a common background as contemplatives was key, both prioresses said.

When the Carmelites unanimously extended an offer to have the Redemptoristines come to live permanently at the Beacon monastery, it was accepted in one day.

Sister Marjorie described the process "as a moment of grace."

"How women of faith respond in faith when there is a need," she explained.

Sister Moira said, "I found that so overwhelming that the Spirit was working so fervently in them."

The monastery had enough room to accommodate an office for the Redemptoristine prioress, work space for the sisters, a community room and living quarters for each sister.

Since both the Carmelites and Redemptoristines are contemplative communities, much of their daily life revolves around prayer. Coming to a monastery where morning Mass was offered each day by priest chaplains and communal prayer takes place four times a day "was a gift from heaven," Sister Moira said.

The day the Redemptoristine Nuns moved in last June "was like coming home," she added. To aid in that feeling, the Redemptoristines have brought some of their religious artwork and statuary that has been tastefully incorporated into the Beacon monastery. "That's been a big accomplishment," Sister Marjorie said.

An icon of Our Mother of Perpetual Help now offers an inviting welcome to the chapel. A set of wooden Stations of the Cross was recently placed. And a stained-glass window of Redemptoristine founder, Venerable Maria Celeste Crostarosa, is awaiting installation.

Though the two religious communities retain their own charisms and are not merged or formally united in any canonical way, their life of prayer is very compatible, both prioresses said. It is carried out in a peaceful setting on 35 wooded acres off Hiddenbrooke Drive. Within view on the landscape are a field and a pond.

As the communities become aware of differences, such as when silence or dedicated prayer times are observed in the respective areas of the house, each is "extra respectful of the silence in the house, so as not to disturb anything," Sister Moira said.

The two groups also share responsibility for preparing meals and keeping the monastery clean and tidy, with more hands making a lighter workload, Sister Marjorie said.

The Beacon monastery, now known as Incarnation Monastery, is a place where mature women religious are living out their vocations in a grace-filled way that offers hope and a shining example for others. They are walking together by faith and letting God fill in the details.

"It makes us a more effective presence for the larger community, for the Church," Sister Marjorie said.



# 2015 Celebration of Religious Life Won't Ignore Problems, Officials Say

Pope Francis has called for a special yearlong focus on consecrated life, asking the Church's religious sisters, brothers and priests to "wake up the world" with their testimony of faith, holiness and hope, a Vatican official said.

"Consecrated men and women are aware that besides recounting the great stories they have written in the past, they are called to write a no-less-beautiful and great story in the future," said Cardinal Joao Braz de Aviz, prefect of the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life.

At a news conference Jan. 31, the cardinal spoke about plans for the 2015 Year for Consecrated Life, which Pope Francis announced in November.

The congregation hopes Pope Francis will celebrate the year's opening Mass Nov. 21, when the Church marks a day of prayer for cloistered religious. The events would conclude one year later on the 50th anniversary of the promulgation of the Second Vatican Council decree "Perfectae Caritatis" on the renewal of religious life.

"We are convinced that the council rep-

resented the breath of the Holy Spirit not only for the entire Church, but in a particular way for consecrated life," Cardinal Aviz said.

"We are also convinced that in these 50 years, consecrated life has followed a fruitful path of renewal—certainly not without difficulties and struggles," the cardinal said. "In this year, we want to recognize and confess our weaknesses, but we also want to show the world with strength and joy the holiness and vitality that are present in consecrated life."

Responding to questions about the huge numbers of religious who have left consecrated life since the council, Archbishop Jose Rodriguez Carballo, congregation secretary, said: "In consecrated life, there are lights and shadows, and recognizing this is an exercise of lucidity and courage. There are lights and shadows, just as in every area of the life of society and of the Church."

The archbishop said he had no problem talking about, and even publishing in the Vatican newspaper, the number of priests, brothers and nuns who leave religious life each year.

"It's part of the crisis that society is living through," he said. "We consecrated

people, thanks be to God, are part of the societies of this world."

In October, the archbishop wrote that between 2008 and 2012, the congregation for religious issued 11,805 dispensations, releasing men and women from their religious vows. Other religious received dispensations from the congregations for the Doctrine of the Faith, for Bishops and for Clergy, bringing to about 3,000 the average number of perpetually professed religious who left each year.

The figures, he said, work out to be about 2.5 dispensations annually for every 1,000 consecrated men and women with perpetual vows.

The Vatican's Statistical Yearbook reported that at the end of 2011, there were more than 903,300 religious priests, brothers and sisters in the world. That figure includes those with temporary vows.

Commemorating the Second Vatican Council during the Year for Consecrated Life will not mean ignoring "the shadows," but it also will not mean wallowing in them, the archbishop said.

"We believe the council was a breath of the Holy Spirit and the point of departure for a profound renewal of consecrated life, which retains its evangelical significance," he said.

"It's sad when a consecrated person leaves, just as it's sad that many families break up, but this is part of the reality of grace and sin that exist in the Church and every human reality," he added.

Cardinal Aviz said a key challenge of being Christian and being a religious is looking toward the future with hope.

"We want to see these crises not as an antechamber of death, but as a 'kairos,' a favorable occasion for growth" and the Year for Consecrated Life should be a further push for doing so, he said.
