Catholic New York is here to help as you prepare your child for the next step. Inside this guide you'll find information on courses, clubs, activities and sports programs for the 49 archdiocesan high schools.

The date and time of open houses are included in each profile, along with the school's website and contact information. Each school is accredited by the New York State Board of Regents, with many schools receiving other distinctions.

Most schools require the Test for Admission to Catholic High Schools (TACHS). The test will be administered in the archdiocese on Friday, Nov. 8. For more information, see story on Page 19B.

Academy of Mount St. Ursula, the Bronx

The Academy of Mount St. Ursula, a girls' school, was founded in 1855 by the Ursuline Sisters.

Students can take Advanced Placement courses in European history, American history, Spanish literature, English literature, biology and calculus. Eligible juniors and seniors earn college credit through a partnership with St. John's University and Mercy College.

Some 30 clubs include cultural clubs; a visual art and drawing academy; a vocal ensemble and instrumental music program taught in collaboration with teaching fellows from the Juilliard School; a music theater program; and an emerging media arts program.

The sports program includes basketball, volley-ball, softball, cheerleading and step.

Academy of Our Lady of Good Counsel, a girls' high school, was founded by the Sisters of the Divine Compassion.


Accredited by the Middle States Association, Good Counsel was named a Blue Ribbon School of Excellence by the U.S. Department of Education.

Albertus Magnus High School, Bardonia

Albertus Magnus is a co-educational school sponsored by the Dominican Sisters of Sparkill.

The college preparatory curriculum offers Advanced Placement courses in all subject areas.

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
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Registration Under Way For Catholic High School Test
