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Common Core Curriculum Zeroes in on Subjects' Similarities

atholic school elementary students across the archdiocese will have plenty of time to play connect the dots in their classrooms this year. But the exercise isn't the traditional dot-to-dot experience as typically drawn with crayons in puzzle books.

Common core curriculum, a new teaching tool, guides students in finding a common denominator across subject areas.

Students are discovering the new curriculum this week as the new academic year officially began Sept. 5.

Joanne L. DeMizio, the archdiocese's

associate superintendent for curriculum and staff development, cited as an example how students studying World War II in social studies may simultaneously read a document related to the war in English Language Arts (ELA). Then, in science, they learn about major advances in medicine during the same time period.

In essence, she said, "They're seeing how the math they do in this class connects to the science they do and to the ELA."

The common core curriculum is part of a strategic plan the archdiocese is implementing to maintain and improve the quality of instruction and faith formation of children.

Also on this year's academic docket

is assessment diversity which, Ms. DeMizio stressed, is not merely a battery of tests and quizzes.

Students, she said, "need to show mastery, or to demonstrate understanding by what we call performance tasks, or solving a complex problem that gets thrown at them and then requires that they use some of the concepts and the skills they learned in a particular area to tackle that."

Mathematics now also has a more multi-dimensional approach that demands additional problem-solving skills utilizing "more relevant, real world problems as a context for understanding mathematics," she said.

Less is more when calculating the common core curriculum's final score.

"We see that the curriculum is a very ambitious curriculum," Ms. DeMizio said, not solely in New York but across the United States and globally.

"When we look internationally at places where students perform much better on exams when they may not have even had that particular subject area or skill covered, it's because they cover less and spend more time on more depth of coverage."

Helping students be college and career ready is a crucial component of the archdiocese's curriculum. "Schools do not prepare students to enter the world of today—they're preparing students to enter the world of tomorrow," Ms. DeMizio said.

Although no one can predict what that world will entail, she said, "there are certain essential skills that students need to have a handle on," namely, "21st century skills."

Students need to be prepared for both college and career "as well as happy and healthy," she said.

And to the more cantankerous students who ask their teachers, "When I am ever going to use this?" the new curriculum aptly reveals the answer.

"That question ought to be answered for them after a week in school," Ms. DeMizio said. "They're going to be able to tell, 'This is how we're going to use it."

The common core curriculum will be implemented in high schools in the archdiocese in 2013-2014.
